
Glasstone Dolan Damage Zone Descriptions*

CATEGORY	EXPECTED DAMAGE BY PSI	THERMAL EXPOSURE
Serious	Overpressures >1 psi (window breakage, minor structural damage)	Thermal Exposure > 2 nd degree burns
Severe	Overpressures >2 psi (doors/windows blown out, widespread structural damage)	Thermal Exposure >3 rd degree burns
Critical	Overpressures > 4 psi (most residential structures collapse)	Thermal Exposure > clothing ignition
Unsurvivable	Overpressures > 10 psi (complete devastation; brick houses, commercial buildings destroyed)	Thermal Exposure > roll roofing ignition / sand explodes




